News from Mr Edwards-Grundy

As we drew together our thoughts on our Value of Responsibility in Collective Worship this week we reflected on two things. Firstly, on Spiderman, who famously said 'with great power comes great responsibility' and the following Bible verse from Micah chapter 6 verse 8.

'What does the Lord require of you? To act justly and to love mercy and to walk humbly with your God.'

Together we thought about the responsibilities that we each have. Some of those responsibilities feel quite small, looking after our possessions in school for example, but when we act responsibly, that has a positive impact on our friends, our teachers and our parents. Some responsibilities however are much bigger, and the impact that we can have is far greater.





Week by week in school we recognise children who have shown our Values. Very often in showing our Values these children have taken responsibility in some way; for their learning, for their behaviour or for the choices they have made.

These decisions, the daily responsible choices, are what helps to make our community a safe and happy place; they also help everyone in our community to flourish.

As we thought about our Bible verse, we were each challenged to think about what it might mean for us to act justly and love mercy. It would be a good conversation to have with your children over the half-term break, sharing ideas of how they can do this as individuals but also how you can do this as a family. If your children have any ideas of action that we can take as a community, do encourage them to feed their ideas back to their class teacher, or to their school council representative.

As I have reflected on the past term, I have been struck by how far your children have travelled. Our youngest children who stepped tentatively into their classrooms for the first time just seven weeks ago have been on a school trip, move confidently around the school, have made friends and built relationships with the staff team. Across the school, children have got stuck into their learning, learned new routines and met new expectations. It has been a real joy to see everyone so settled and enjoying all the opportunities that school has to offer them. Well done to them all – we are hugely privileged to work with your children.

As you are aware, we are currently working on our new school website. Head lice

Sadly head lice are an inescapable part of primary school life. They are however miserable for children who have them and easily treated.

We would be very grateful if over the halfterm you could check your child's hair for lice and eggs and if you find them, treat them.

To help us reduce the spread of head lice amongst our children, we would encourage you to make conditioning your child's chair and combing it with a nit comb, part of your regular practice.

Tying back long hair will also help reduce the spread of head lice.
