News from Mr Edwards-Grundy

As we have continued to look at our Value of Unity and Co-operation, we thought this week about being what the Bible calls being 'beautifully and wonderfully made'. In Collective Worship we thought together about how being different adds richness to our community and that though we are all different, each of us is valuable.

It was a delight to hear your children talking through the importance of disagreeing well, it is a challenge that many of us struggle with as adults! As a community we talked about where a disagreement can turn into an argument and why we should avoid that. We can not only be different, but hold different views, disagreement between members of our community does not stop there being unity.

Whilst different points of view can seem to add to the challenge (they can certainly be hard work), we concluded that these differences actually bring real richness to our community.

We enjoyed reading together a passage from the Bible all about unity, where Christians are described as a body –

'Now if the foot should say, "Because I am not a hand, I do not belong to the body," it would not for that reason stop being part of the body. And if the ear should say, "Because I am not an eye, I do not belong to the body," it would not for that reason stop being part of the body. If the whole body were an eye, where would the sense of hearing be? If the whole body were an ear, where would the sense of smell be? But in fact God has placed the parts in the body, every one of them, just as he wanted them to be. If they were all one part, where would the body be? As it is, there are many parts, but one body.

The eye cannot say to the hand, "I don't need you!" And the head cannot say to the feet, "I don't need you!" God has put the body together, giving greater honour to the parts that lacked it, so that there should be no division in the body, but that its parts should have equal concern for each other.'

The passage reminded us that we are not all meant to be the same, we are in fact better for our differences, it is the way we were created to be. And where our differences make things hard, our Values give us a way to manage that well. I am looking forward to continuing to explore together how our Christian Values can help us co-operate together and to be a community characterised by unity.

The children then blew a BIG BAD hairdryer from the same distance away for the same amount of time. Despite 'huffing and puffing', they could blow none of them down!












The children worked really well in their teams, co-operating with one another both to design and build their houses.
