This week in Collective Worship we were joined by lots of pirates!

We spent our time together on Monday morning thinking more about Kindness, which is our Value for this month. We started by reminding ourselves of what we had thought about already, embracing interruptions and kindness being an action, before moving on to read the story of 'The Smartest Giant in Town' by Julia Donaldson.

In the story, the giant is fed up with being scruffy and so he buys himself a whole new outfit. 'Now I'm the smartest giant in town' he says to himself proudly. However, it is not long before he starts meeting animals in need, first it is a giraffe lacking a scarf, then a goat in a boat who needs a sail, a mouse in need of a house, a fox without a bed and a dog who is struggling to cross a bog. To each of the animals in need the giant readily gives an item of his clothing, until he is left with just his old scruffy gown and sandals. The giant was no longer the smartest giant in town.

The book ends with the animals the giant has helped presenting him with a crown and a letter that says 'here is a very fine crown to go with the sandals and gown of the KINDEST giant in town.'

The story was familiar to most of our children. If it is a story you don't know, please do visit the library in Witney town centre and borrow a copy, it's a lovely read.

The familiarity of the story helped us to focus on the key messages. The giant was initially only interested in himself and his appearance, he wanted to look smart and he felt proud when he was. However, it did not take long for the giant to realise that the animals were facing a challenge that he could do something about. Meeting the needs of the animals cost the giant something, he no longer looked smart, he could not boast about his appearance anymore.

Together we reflected that being kind to others can be a costly thing. It can cost us something that is important to us, as being smart was important to the giant. The giant gave up being the smartest giant in town, but was recognised instead for something far greater, for being the kindest giant in town.

With the children I wondered what might being kind to others cost us and when we are faced with the choice, will we choose what is important to us, or will we choose to be kind?
