This week in Collective Worship we continued to think about Trust.

We enjoyed reading the story of David and Goliath, which you can find in 1 Samuel chapter 17. Goliath is a Giant, day in and day out he is taunting the Israelite Army and no-one is brave enough to fight him. David is a young shepherd boy, who trusts God and who takes on Goliath and wins.

Hearing about David gave us the opportunity to think about how trust grows over time. David's trust was in God. His trust had grown over time because as a shepherd boy he had learned that God could and would keep him safe.

We thought about how our trust in people grows over time. When we meet people and start to make friends we have to learn to trust them. The children were great at thinking about how they might start to trust a new friend, perhaps first with little things and then gradually with bigger things until they are sure that their friend is trustworthy.

As adults each of us knows the importance of learning to trust, some of us are better at it than others! And yet trust is central to us building friendships that can support and help us in the ups and downs of life, when we face our own Goliath!

This week I have had cause to think about my own Goliath, the thing that, if I let it, will taunt me and stop me from flourishing. As a Christian, my challenge is to learn to trust God as David did. My trust in God grows little by little as I trust him in small things and know that he is caring for me and watching over me.

I pray that whatever your particular Goliath, you will find people in whom you can place your trust and who will help you grow into a Giant slayer.

21st October 1914

He's rather kind hearted, he even got me checked up at the vet. Even if he bought me for £40 when I was a perfect specimen, nevertheless I have forgave him.

Also how's Albert? I hope he's doing fine. Last I saw him he walked quickly, then he ran, then he sprinted from the way tears flew out of the small pools of emotion. I know he knew nothing of this betrayal. He begged for him to join the army but he could only join when he was of age; I tried to pull back to him but Albert told me there was nothing we can do for now. 
