News from Mr Edwards-Grundy

In Collective Worship this week, I read the children the story of the 'Library Lion' by Michelle Knudsen. It is one of my favourite stories, beautifully illustrated, simple and yet compelling in the message it conveys. The book tells of the conflict between obeying the rules and when a rule should be broken.

As we continued to think about our Value of Goodness, the story helped us think about when displaying that Value may mean obeying a different set of rules.

The Old Testament set out a very clear set of rules for when people had wronged others. 'An eye for an eye and a tooth for a tooth.' But Jesus, in the New Testament, told his followers that he had come to bring a new set of rules. It was Gandhi that said,

'An eye for an eye only ends up making the whole world blind.'

And so, in Collective Worship we thought about a new set of rules, rules that reflect the way that Jesus chose to live his life and that he encouraged others to live their lives by also. The Book of Romans puts it like this –

'Do not be overcome by evil but overcome evil with good.'

We all agreed that the New Testament rule was a lot harder to live by than the Old Testament one! It can be extraordinarily hard to show Goodness in the face of rudeness, hate, unkindness and hurt.

In school we are trying to live by a different set of rules, recognising along with Gandhi that paying someone back for the pain they have caused you by inflicting exactly the same kind of pain on them simply leaves everyone in the same boat. Living that way 'makes the whole world blind'.

In trying to overcome evil with good, we need the help of one another. Showing Goodness when we are the ones that have been hurt is rarely something we can achieve on our own, we need the encouragement and support of those around us. It is one of the reasons why we need our community around us, cheering us on and encouraging us.

Another translation of the Romans Bible verse says, 'Don't let evil conquer you, but conquer evil by doing good.' I find that translation very helpful. When we are faced with hard and difficult things, we can seek revenge/payback, we can allow the evil to conquer us, it is perhaps our most natural reaction. However, choosing to do good, to show Goodness, brings about a change for us and for our community, it conquers evil.

This week, the challenge for all of us in school is not to give back the hurt that we have received, but instead to show Goodness. As the Library Lion found out, sometimes there are different rules that are even more important!

This week, we had great pleasure in awarding Values certificates to children who had chosen to show our Values even when it was particularly challenging. Well done to them all, their actions are making our community a better place for all of us.



Extending the school day

Earlier this year the government announced their intention to require schools to remain open for 32.5 hours each week, a school day of 6.5 hours.

Our school day is currently 6.25 hours and therefore from September we will be increasing the length of our school day by 15 minutes.

This means that from September our school doors will open at 8.40am, with registers being taken at 8.50am. Children arriving after 8.50am will need to come into the school via the front office. Our ABC breakfast provision will therefore also start ten minutes earlier, at 7.40am.

At the end of the school day, doors will open at 3.20pm.

We will send further reminders regarding this ready for the new academic year.
