We really enjoyed welcoming members of the St Mary's Cogges team to lead Collective Worship on Monday this week.

The team began with a game to help us all think about what is fair and what is not. When asked to give him a hi-5, Cameron realised just how tall Chris is!

We all then enjoyed listening to a story of two brothers, both of whom farm the land and have corn. One brother has a family, the other does not. The brother with a family thinks of his sibling and worries that he has no-one to care for him and to look after him in his old age and so he secretly leaves more corn for him. The other brother thinks of his sibling and thinks he must struggle to care for his family, so he secretly leaves more corn for him. One night they meet each other, leaving corn for one another and realise how they have been looking after each other.

The story is a beautiful one, reminding all of us that justice doesn't always look quite how we imagine it might. For the brothers, justice would have looked like them both having half of the corn each. The brothers however were not interested simply in justice, they cared for one another and wanted the other to have what they needed. Each of the brothers was willing to give up something that was theirs in order to give the person they loved something they believed the other needed more than they needed it.

Children and adults alike were challenged in their thinking. What does it mean in our friendships and our community not simply to give one another justice, but to make sure that everyone has what they need? We all live in different circumstances and each of us needs different things. As we seek to live and work together, we need to look more widely than simply ensuring there is justice. In our classrooms and workplaces, we were each challenged to think about where we can give to others, not simply to ensure justice, important though that is, but to meet each other's needs.

In our Collective Worship times, and our reflective times in classes, we are now using a resource called Fischy Music, a library of songs for children and adults. The songs are easy to learn (especially when Mrs Raven is teaching you) and are written to help children celebrate the good times and build resilience for the hard times. Do ask your children to share some of the songs with you; I hope you enjoy them as much as we are enjoying them in school.

Values Awards


It was, as always, a great pleasure to congratulate children on achieving a Values Award.


Children continue to impact positively on our community by living out our Values and making deliberate choices to bring a little bit of heaven on earth.




News from Around the School
