In Collective Worship on Monday we thought about the story of Joseph. You can read the full story of Joseph in Genesis chapters 37 and 39-50.

Joseph was mistreated by his brothers and sold into slavery. Many years later when famine swept the land, Joseph's brothers were forced to seek aid and in so doing they once again came face to face with the brother they had so badly mistreated. The brothers' actions had led to Joseph being a slave, being imprisoned and missing out on years with his family.

We talked about how we would have felt if we were Joseph and the conflicting emotions that we would have experienced. We all agreed that forgiveness would have been very hard for Joseph, even though he would have been so pleased to see his father again.

As it was for Joseph, so forgiveness can be for us, a very costly thing. The Christian story of Easter is a reminder of the cost that our wrongdoings had on Jesus – putting things right with God led Jesus to death on the cross.

Forgiveness sets us and others free, it may be costly, but it can also be life-changing.

Please make sure your child is wearing uniform to school, especially on PE days.
