News from Mr Edwards-Grundy

You may have heard rumours that this week in Collective Worship I smashed Mrs Henderson's mug... The rumours are true!*

In Collective Worship we were continuing our thoughts on Justice. Smashing Mrs Henderson's mug allowed us all to think about what it is like when something happens that upsets us, or someone does something to hurt us. Children and adults alike could recall times when we have been wronged. Together, remembering those times of hurt, we reflected on what Justice might mean.

Our Bible passage was one that is familiar to many of us, it can be found in the Gospel of Matthew -

'Why do you look at the speck of sawdust in your brother's eye and pay no attention to the plank in your own eye? How can you say to your brother 'Let me take the speck out of your eye' when all the time there is a plank in your own eye? You hypocrite, first take the plank out of your own eye, and then you will see clearly to remove the speck from your brother's eye.'

When thinking about Justice we all agreed that it is much easier to think about the things that other people do wrong than it is to acknowledge where we make mistakes or hurt other people. It only took us a moment of honesty however to recognise that we all have specks of sawdust in our eyes...

I broke Mrs Henderson's mug, deliberately, with a hammer. (All health and safety procedures were followed!) I did something wrong, that hurt someone else. The question to the children of what Justice should look like was a deeply relevant one. Within any community things go wrong, people hurt and upset other people, sometimes they even do it deliberately – what should Justice look like?

Within The Blake School we talk often about forgiveness and restoration, we encourage children (and adults) to accept apologies and to work together to re-build relationships and find a way to move forward. Justice however recognises that there must also sometimes be consequences. As we thought about consequences, important as they are in ensuring Justice, we returned full circle to our Bible passage remembering that it is not just our brother that has something in his eye!

*For any children that were worried, none of Mrs Henderson's favourite mugs were broken in the delivery of Collective Worship! Mrs Henderson played her part very well.

Values Awards
